# PUSH TO REMOVE SHARK NETS

In the coming months more than 51 shark nets are set to be installed at several beaches across the NSW coastline. In response, environmental conservationists across the country, supported by the Greens Party, are calling on the NSW Government to phase out the destructive shark net program altogether. The marine-friendly campaign is asking for an increase in non-lethal shark management strategies to be initiated across NSW's many beach ahead of Summer as an alternative.

The recently released Annual Performance Report of the Shark Meshing Program and the Government's trial of SMART drumlines and other non-lethal strategies on North Coast beaches have shown that shark nets are the worst of all options for marine life and the health of the ocean.

The 2016/17 report found 373 animals to have been caught in the nets with 57 per cent of those catches ending in death. Further, most of the animals caught were non-dangerous animals including dolphins and turtles.

Greens MLC and Marine Spokesperson, Justin Field, supports the push to remove shark nets as they are an outdated technology that are taking a severe toll on marine life across the state.

"Shark nets may make ocean goers feel better but the evidence shows they are not effective against target sharks and don't make swimmers or surfers significantly safer.

"The Government's trial of SMART drumlines and other non-lethal strategies on the North Coast caught more sharks than the net trial over the same period. There were almost no non-target marine creatures caught on drumlines and almost all sharks were tagged and released alive.

It is said that phasing out destructive shark nets and replacing them with modern technologies will reduce the risk of shark bites without killing our much loved marine animals in the process – a win-win.

# NAOMI SIMSON

**ENTREPRENEURIAL EXTRAORDINAIRE** 



ydney Observer's Hanna Moore discusses all things RedBalloon, Shark Tank and what it takes to start a successful business from the ground up with Naomi Simson. From her flourishing digital presence to a successful pursuit into the literary world, Naomi demonstrates how a good idea, hard work and a positive attitude can make an extraordinary impact in the world.

Australian entrepreneur, blogger and small-business enthusiast Naomi Simson is widely known as the infamous 'Red Shark' on Channel 10's latest television craze, Shark Tank. However, it was founding the online retail juggernaut RedBalloon, where she originally got started in the world of entrepreneurship.

RedBalloon started as idea to provide experiential gift services in 2001. After it took almost 4 months to make the first sale, the online business has now served over three million customers and supported countless businesses in the process. Today, the site connects almost 4000 unique experience gift ideas, sourced from more than 1500 business partners across Australia and New Zealand.

"I saw an opportunity for bringing together other fabulous small businesses to the market by giving them a brand, as well as people getting to have amazing experiences," says Naomi.

"The internet was in its early days and I took the plunge, got my overhead flow and built the business organically."

The brilliance of RedBalloon, and much of what can be attributed to its success, is its passionate support of the small business industry in Australia. This mantra is also carried throughout the entire process of management, ensuring those working for the company know what it is they're working for. Naturally, this further saw the development of 'Redii', a platform that recognises and supports other businesses.

"It's about having a deep sense of purpose; everyone here knows why we do what we do. When people know why they're here, and when somebody notices, they get to go home feeling like a winner.

"When you buy from RedBalloon you're supporting thousands of other small businesses, and you get to tick something off your bucket list. Everybody's a winner."

Throughout RedBalloon's success Naomi ventured into the world of blogging, both through her own website naomisimson. com, and as a LinkedIn Influencer. For Naomi, this venture is not a matter of expanding a brand, it's about sharing experiences. Now surpassing two million followers on LinkedIn and over 1000 blogs published on her own website, Naomi has an enormous platform to inspire change and growth in recounting her own

"That's about sharing what I've learned with an educational and professional platform," says Naomi.

Her namesake website, characterised by the signature red font, guides readers through a journey of boosting business together. 'The Huddle' invites the reader to get involved in a conversation on progress for businesses through a Facebook community involving 'Live Sessions', where viewers can even choose the topic for discussion. Along with this, a series of insightful and educational blogs on business and entrepreneurship from over 15 years of personal experience in the

Naomi's experience in the digital world has also shown that it's essential to understand that social media is an important asset to create a platform that is honest, rather than a tool for simply furthering a marketing message.

"People often see social media as a push tool, but it's actually a listening tool and a sharing tool.

"It's about engaging audiences and sharing what you've learnt and being a role model for others."

As the author of four books, Naomi credits 'Ready to Soar' as the perfect choice for readers looking to build a business. The book delves into the business of smallbusiness and guides readers through getting an idea off the ground.

"I wrote 84,000 words on how to start a business and whether you're meant to be an entrepreneur... What I don't want is for people to spend their life savings on something that may or may not have

The book aims to prevent potential or current business-owners from doing just that, as well as avoiding other pitfalls that many start-ups often face through pragmatic, real-world advice drawn from personal experience. For those just starting out, the importance of knowing your ideas, formulating them properly and making plans to develop your own path is

"They [budding entrepreneurs] need to work before they start a business, that's really, really important."

Season three of Channel 10's Shark Tank has just wrapped up and Naomi's iconic role as the 'Red Shark' resonates with her continued message of support for those looking to start a business.

"I wanted to support other businesses to grow, there's nothing like being a mentor. There's five people helping them [the contestants] grow their business, giving them ideas and a support network, so it's a very valuable exercise for people."

"I wish I had had five people, not just to help me with money, but also in terms of mentoring. It's very powerful."

When asked about whether her experiences in business provided her with advice specific for women looking to launch a startup, Naomi was clear that gender doesn't necessarily play a role in being a successful businessperson.

"I definitely do not put gender into a conversation about start-ups. If you've got an idea, it's not about gender. It's about your tenacity, it's about your ability to understand your customer needs and being able to execute on it.

"We have an incredibly balanced team with both Janine [Allis] and I on the show, and you see we'll often differ in our opinions. We're not one homogeneous group."

As for the idealised notion of a 'worklife' balance, Naomi reflects on whether 'balance' is really necessary when you love what you do.

"I don't claim to have all that work-life balance at all. If you want to change the world, it takes energy and effort, it's not

Everyone needs their downtime however, and true-to-form, Naomi's spare time is filled with an active family life and a number of hobbies to stay inspired.

"I do yoga, I paint, I cook, and I have four children. So they keep me pretty busy.

"When you love what you do, it doesn't feel like work. Share the love, I say!"

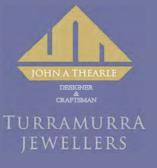

It's official. NSW apprenticeships and traineeships are on the up!

The Deputy Premier and Minister for Skills, John Barilaro, has highlighted new data that shows the number of people taking up apprenticeships or traineeships in NSW climbing. This is thought to be a positive sign for the state's vocational education and training (VET) sector.

The latest report from the National Centre for Vocational Education Research (NCVER) has depicted a 2.3 per cent increase in NSW apprenticeship and traineeship starts in the enrolment before March 2017 when compared to the previous year group.

"The latest research is great news for NSW and shows 47 100 people started

an apprenticeship or traineeship in NSW," says Mr Barilaro, "What's even more exciting is that the latest March quarter figures were even stronger - a 7.1 per cent jump in 2017 on the 2016 March guarter."

"More and more people are realising that VET can provide an effective pathway to gain in-demand qualifications that lead to rewarding careers. Our VET sector is producing highly skilled graduates who can get job and pay outcomes comparable - and in some cases even better than university graduates.

"VET training offers pathways to many jobs that are seeing strong growth in the future, from the traditional trades to healthcare, biotech, cyber security, agriculture, ICT, and tourism."

These latest NCVER results also show growth of 1.5 per cent in the number of NSW people taking up trades like plumbing, carpentry and electrotechnology which will support our industry sectors which are facing skills shortages.

This research comes on the back of an NCVER report released in July which showed government-funded VET student numbers in NSW grew by 38 per cent in 2016 under our Smart and Skilled system - significantly higher than a national increase of 3.3 per cent.

Last month, the NSW Government launched the "Doors to Opportunity" VET campaign to change perceptions around the industry and encourage people to consider VET as a credible alternative to university.

### **MEDITIATION IN SCHOOL:** COULD CHILDREN **BENEFIT FROM**

'MINDFULNESS' **CURRICULUM?**

he integration of technology into the classroom has increased distraction and decreased the attention span of school students. Diagnoses of mental illness such as depression and anxiety is also on the rise, particularly for young people. Could mindfulness be the answer?

Based on Buddhist teachings, this form of meditation is said to increase wellbeing and is hitting schools both abroad and at home in the hopes of increasing student performance and wellbeing.

It focuses on being self-aware and simply being 'in the present', with a main pillar of the exercise advising people to simply accept and not judge any stray thoughts that may enter their mind while meditating.

Mindfulness has been found to decrease students' stress levels and promote a greater attention span in the classroom. Research conducted by the Mindfulness in Schools Project based in the UK says that mindfulness has a direct impact on the cognitive development of young people. A report cited in this research claimed that 34 adolescents diagnosed with learning disabilities showed marked traits of academic improvement after undertaking a five-week meditation program.

Its popularity is quickly gaining momentum overseas, as seen in the adoption of the Mindfulness in Schools Project by the UK, the US, Canada, parts of Europe and

Australia. The UK-based initiative offers several programs dedicated to both primary and secondary-aged children.

Various organisations aimed at introducing and spreading awareness of the benefits of mindfulness to Australian students have similarly been founded. Smiling Mind, an Australian nonprofit organisation, hopes to introduce mindfulness meditation into the Australian National Curriculum by 2020. The Australian mental health initiative Kids Matter's 'Mindful Schools' program also aims to target children's emotional and social skills through meditation, as well as teaching mindfulness in a child-

Several schools in Australia have already taken up the helm and made mindfulness part of their school curriculum. MLC School in Sydney and Geelong Grammar are both examples of schools that have made this form of meditation a necessary component of their students' studies.

# US scholarship awarded to College graduate

A 2016 graduate from Roseville College has secured the prestigious Robertson Scholarship and will be heading to study abroad at Duke University in the US.

> Zoe King, Dux of Roseville College, was one of 27 recipients of the scholarship world-wide and was the only Australian to be awarded one.

"I pursued a Robertson Scholarship because it recognises the effort you've made so far as a student; but the greater emphasis is on your future potential," Zoe says.

Zoe was School Captain and an HSC All-Round Achiever in 2016, a remarkable achievement considering how she had completed the rigorous application process while also preparing for her final exams.

Duke University is ranked 8th in the US and is extremely selective. The Robertson Scholarship is valued at up to \$AU350 000 over four years.

"I am very excited for the experiences abroad...that will further widen my perspective of the world around me," Zoe says.

#### **Roseville student wins Henry Lawson prose competition**

Roseville College student Darcey White, 15, has won the

poetry category of the 2017 Henry Lawson Festival of Arts Short Story and Verse competition.

Darcey submitted a poem titled "Mars and Stars", a piece inspired by the concept of "star-crossed lovers" in Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet.

"I hoped to encourage the audience to question what is valid and invalid in love, when we struggle to define what it is, or how to rationalise it," Darcey says.

The poem uses the metaphor of science to explore how love cannot be constrained by social parameters.

"The metaphor connects science and space, which are supported by evidence, to time and love that are vulnerable and human, and arguably cannot be measured by numbers and figures," she says.

This was the fourth time a Roseville College student has won the Henry Lawson competition, with the previous being Sejung Park in 2009 and 2011 and Alex Turner in 2016.

Local Education Capital Boost

he NSW Government is boosting education facilities on Sydney's North Shore, including at four schools in the Davidson electorate.

Work continues to transform the former University of Technology Sydney's Lindfield campus into a new modern school complex with a wide range of student facilities. The new campus will ultimately accommodate around 2,000 students in six home base schools under the Government's Future Focussed Learning approach. The first student intake will be in 2019.

St Ives North Public School will receive 19 new permanent teaching spaces and upgraded core facilities to replace demountable classrooms and accommodate projected enrolment growth.

There will be a significant upgrade to sporting facilities at St Ives High School. A number of basketball courts will be constructed along with a synthetic sports field and an upgraded car park. It is proposed the sporting facilities will be available for use by the broader community outside school hours. 11 classrooms at the school will also be refurbished.

Killara High School students will benefit from 19 new teaching spaces, replacing the remaining demountable classrooms and providing room for future growth. This follows major capital works at Killara High just a few years ago.

NSW Education Minister, Rob Stokes (pictured with Principal Jane Dennett) recently visited the school to announce a \$50 million funding injection for school principals to employ extra support staff. The additional personnel will provide principals with more time to undertake core duties such as curriculum planning, monitoring student progress, improving teaching quality and ensuring student well-being.

The additional funding for both new staff and facilities will help deliver the education standards our community needs and deserves. I am delighted the NSW Government is delivering these muchneeded education resources for our young people.

## "LEARN TO SWIM" THIS SUMMER

ith a long history in the Wahroonga community, the volunteer-run Bush School Learn to Swim Club registrations are once again open for the summer season.

Its humble beginnings span back to 1958 when the pool was built by the local school community and ran swimming classes predominantly teaching children aged 4-12 the skills and safety requirements of being in the pool.

Now in its 49th season, the club currently teaches students these valuable skills, which are especially important for those hot Australian summers, through a completely volunteer -led production. The volunteers go through on-site, hands-on training to walk away with the vitals skills needed to teach swimming. The Club always welcomes new volunteers, with current volunteers starting at age 13, and the oldest is 83!

The Club offers a number of perks in that students are graded by their abilities as opposed to their age. In doing this, the volunteers can provide a much more effective method of teaching each class. The Club also offers classes at multiple times each Saturday to provide

flexibility for parents of children involved in multiple sporting commitments.

The cost of classes start at \$105 for one swimmer, \$175 for two swimmers and \$230 for three or more swimmers. Registrations open October 1 and remain open throughout the entire season.

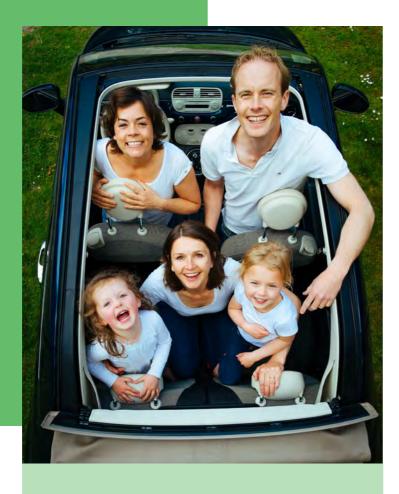

# Care Work & Career: A balancing act



For many families, striking a balance between work and family life is strained when negotiating flexible working hours has become increasingly more difficult, a new survey from the Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU) has found.

Of the 5,400 Australians who responded to the survey, 85 per cent of working adults also had significant caring and/or parenting responsibilities at home. These results indicate that the average Australian family no longer fits stereotypical archetypes and the ACTU argues that working conditions need to adjust accordingly.

In light of this, the ACTU has launched its new campaign 'Change the Rules for Working Women & Families'. This campaign aims to tackle the gender pay gap, provide a better balance for work and family life and incorporate 10 days of paid family and domestic violence leave universally.

Of the 12 million working Australians, 5.6 million working families are living as a couple, and almost one million are working sole parent families.

ACTU President Ged Kearney stands firmly on changing the workplace culture that inhibits many families from providing care, stating:

"We are a country of working people who value our loved ones more than anything else, but often we are stopped from providing the care needed because our workplace laws and rules have not kept up with modern life."

The survey indicated that many Australian's were uncertain about approaching management to ask for more flexible hours for fear of losing

job security and a rigid workplace culture. Almost 40 per cent had approached their employer in regards to reduced or more flexible hours and many reported being rejected in this process.

"Many of the survey respondents said their workplace culture was not flexible and others said they did not ask their employer for reduced working hours because they feared they would get sacked. This is the disgraceful reality of our modern workplaces."

This campaign also recognises that women are predominantly the primary caregiver for many families. Additionally, the survey showed that women were twice as likely to ask for reduced hours at work and the gender pay gap currently exists at 16 per cent. The ACTU acknowledges that things need to change to ensure that workers are being treated equally in the workplace.

"Australian women and families shouldn't need to fit into outdated broken system. We are arguing that we need modern workplaces and modern laws."

The ACTU have applied to the Fair Work Commission for the right of workers to temporarily reduce their working hours in the case of pressing family commitments, and return to regular working hours once those commitments have alleviated. This submission will be heard by the Commission in December this year.

The ACTU argues that quality working hours should be the right of any family with work and family responsibilities.

"The ACTU is is committed to continuing to use every available option to make this a reality for working women and families."

SYDNEY LANDS NEW METRO TRAIN

Sydney's first metro train landed on Australian shores late last month as part of a plan to completely revolutionise public transport in Australia.

The six carriages of the first metro train have arrived at the Sydney Metro Trains Facility in Rouse Hill and will be prepared for testing over the coming months. Meanwhile, the first 1 kilometer of tracks have also been laid on the iconic skytrain at Rouse Hill.

This has been part of the biggest public transport project in Australian history. The Sydney Metro Northwest, worth \$8.3 billion, is currently is stage one of development, which aims to eventually become the first fully automated metro rail system in Australia.

"In two years, people living in the North West will get a train every four minutes in the peak in each direction, a level of service never before seen in Australia," says Andrew Constance, Minister of Transport and Infrastructure.

RETIREMENT REGULATIONS ROLLED OUT

Last month, NSW Fair Trading implemented the NSW Retirement Villages Regulation 2017 which will allow for greater transparency in the fee structure, head office expenses and annual budgets.

Part of this implementation will be the introduction of an online fee comparison tool to compare village pricing, designed in collaboration with The Property Council and NSW Fair Trade.

"The Property Council welcomes the introduction of the Regulation as it makes it simpler for potential retirement village residents to easily compare value offerings and supports the key changes to standard disclosure provisions for village fee structures," said Property Council NSW Executive Director Jane Fitzgerald.

This implementation also allows for adding new matters for which village rules can be created, such as smoking in communal areas, and allowing the service of documents to be done via electronic means.

## **Health Corner**



#### The Women's Health Survey 2017

The recent survey revealed Australian women's physical activity levels and their perceptions on fitness and health. The research found that most women were satisfied with their current health status, with three quarters describing their health to be "good" or "very good". However, 60 per cent of women are failing to hit the recommended 2.5 hours of moderate exercise per week and many cite a lack of time or being too tired as key reasons. Of concern is how women are gathering health information, with many preferring Wikipedia or Google over VIC Health and the Australian Government Health Department website.



#### **Ballet Barre Workouts**

Exercising at the barre, ballet-style has recently gained popularity for its low-impact workout regimen. Barre practitioners claim that you can gain a ballerina's muscle endurance while increasing your flexibility, strength and balance by practicing ballet drills to tone your muscles. Studio lessons are available in Sydney but lessons are often expensive, so some recommend replicating the barre at home with the back of a chair or a benchtop. Barre classes are great for seniors due to the workouts relatively low risk of injury.



#### Eating protein

Research by the McGill University Health Centre in Canada has found that seniors who eat protein three times a day will be at lower risk of muscle loss. The Centre revealed that it is important to spread protein portions evenly across the day, even during breakfast. From a study conducted over three years with nearly 1800 participants aged 67-84 years, they discovered that people who also consumed protein during the day compared to those who consumed protein predominantly for dinner had more muscle strength. This supports the belief that the elderly need to consume more protein to improve muscle mass and prevent frailty, but having balanced portions over 24 hours will maximise the benefits.

Periodontal disease is a chronic inflammatory disease of the gums and tissues that support the teeth. It is caused by bacteria that exist in everyone's mouths that multiply if not removed by regular brushing. Once the bacteria start multiplying, it builds up like barnacles on a boat, particularly around the gum line.

Excess bacteria in the mouth will cause a chronic inflammation around the teeth. leading to redness, bleeding and finally the gums pulling away from the teeth. The inflammation will also set up a cascade effect of tissue destruction and toxins that will pass into the blood stream. Periodontal disease has been linked to many diseases including heart disease, diabetes and kidnev disease.

Infertility has been reported to affect up to 1 in 7 couples worldwide. Some of the latest research findings are suggesting a potential link between gum disease and pregnancy complications. This includes interference with conception and suggests links to miscarriage and premature birth.

Fertility research is increasingly indicating that gum disease may potentially lengthen

the time it takes for a woman to become pregnant by an average of an extra two months. This includes research form some IVF studies which shows the success rate of IVF treatment may be reduced in patients suffering from periodontal disease.

A recent study suggested that in men with periodontal disease, sperm mobility was reduced in up to 33% of cases.

Dental care should therefore become an important part of pregnancy planning. Healthy gums do not bleed. Bleeding or sore gums should be treated immediately. Regular brushing and flossing of teeth is the best way of preventing gum disease coupled with professional cleaning from your Dentist.

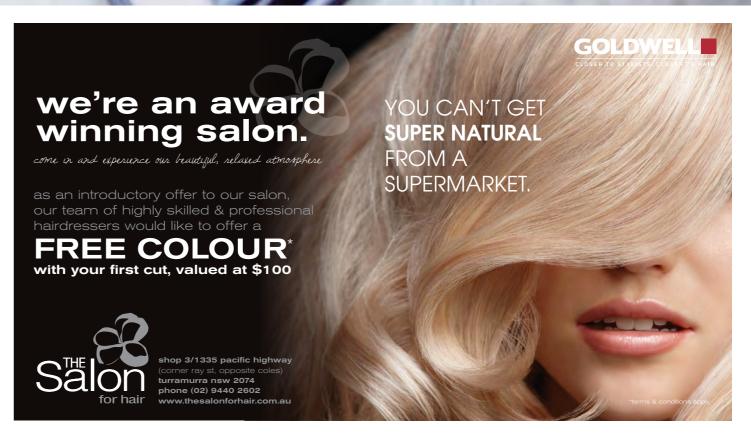

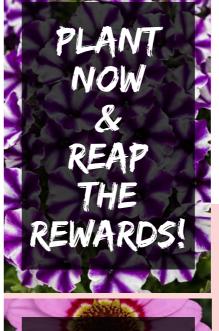
The Chairman of the Centre of Organic Research and Education (CORE), Eric Love, supports the push to go organic as a key way to target Australia's burgeoning landfill problems.

Stephen Cartwright.

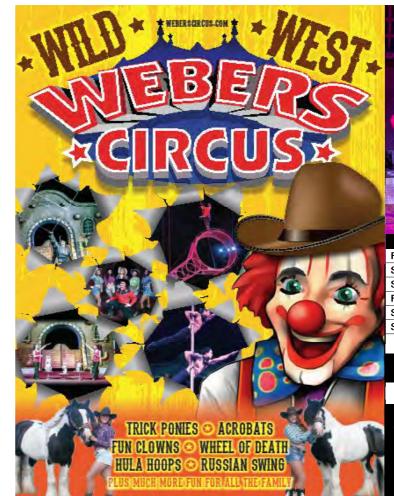

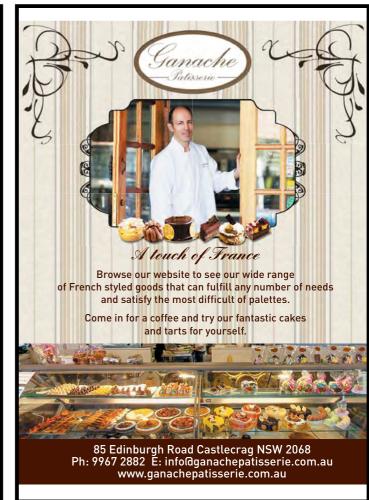

Cuba, South American gem of culture, art and music, is a must-see country for your next travel adventure. Often judged by its political strife and communist regime, or only experienced through Las Vegas's slice of Havana heaven, it's worth the chance to explore the country for yourself. The hurricane season hits in June-November and crowds are massive throughout Christmas and New Year's. Sydney Observer recommends the winter months as the best time to experience the Cuban summer, with special deals and smaller crowds helping you to enjoy the place as best as possible.



One of the many museums in Cuba, this particular museum is located in Old Havana and a popular tourist destination to learn about the country's political history. The museum is part of the Presidential Palace and its interior is designed by none other than Tiffany's of New York in the early 20th century. The museum's exhibitions tell the story of the Cuban Revolution in the 1950s, complete with bullet holes in the wall made during an attempt to assassinate then President Fulgencio Batista.



Immerse yourself in Cuba's teeming artistic landscape filled with bold colours and crude yet childlike designs. The originally derelict suburb of Havana's Jaimanitas was transformed by Cuban artist José Fuster in the 1980s after being inspired by the works of Gaudi and Brâncusi. His artworks have created a neighbourhood of fantastical landscapes and is the epitome of Cuba's unique and transformative artistic culture.

#### VARADERO

This laidback beach resort stretches across Cuba's Hicaco's Peninsular and is the engine of the country's tourism industry. Powdery sands and azure-blue waters dotted with bars and hotels will allow you to experience Cuba's coastal scenery in a way that's different to Sydney's overcrowded Bondi Beach.

#### **ACCOMODATION**

Other than government-run hotels, which can often be expensive. experienced travellers recommend renting Airbnb or bed-and-breakfast type home-stays, called casas particulares, scattered throughout Havana for easy access to tourist hotspots.



#### MONEY

The two official currencies of Cuba is the Suban convertible peso (CUC) and the Cuban peso (CUP). The CUP is often only used for street food or local shops, with 1 CUC worth roughly 26 CUP. The CUC and CUP are only convertible in Cuba itself, so be sure to bring with you a fair amount of cash, preferably British pounds or Euros. The average traveller usually spends up to 75 CUC per day including food, drink, travel and accommodation.

It's important to note that credit cards or traveller's cheques that are issued by American banks or by Australian banks affiliated with American banks will not be accepted in Cuba. Ensure that you have a decent amount of emergency cash so funds do not run dry before your adventure is over.

#### TRAVEL TIPS

The Australian Smart Traveller website warns about the dangers of petty crime in Cuba. particularly at night. It's also important to note that you will likely be detained if involved in a driving accident and may not be allowed to leave the country until the matter is resolved. There is no Australian Embassy in Cuba, but the Canadian Embassy and the Australian Embassy in Mexico will be able to assist Australians in Cuba.

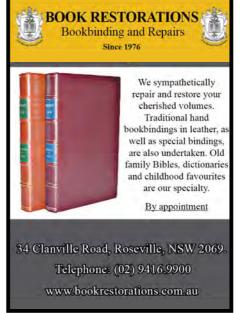

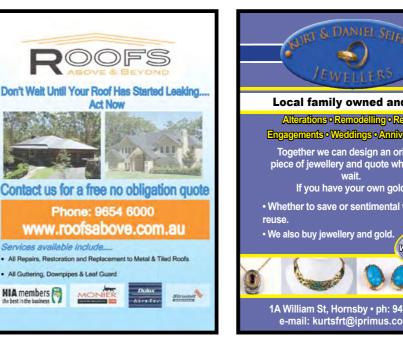

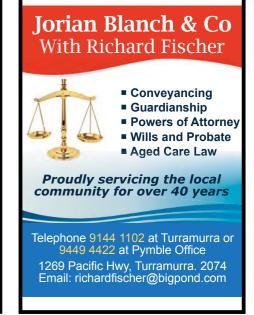
