

Clean Up Australia Day

The 29th annual Clean Up Australia Day commences on March 3rd, with the Ku-ring-gai Council endorsing locals to get involved. The event is the first since the October 2018 passing away of founder and Sydney yachtsman, Ian Kiernan, who initiated the organisation in 1990.

Community participation in keeping the environment clean is a great incentive for boosting civic spirit and pride. "Ku-ring-gai prides itself on its natural beauty, and it's wonderful when people come together to help keep it that way," said Ku-ring-gai Mayor, Jennifer Anderson.

To take part in the nationwide rubbish reduction, residents can join a registered clean up site or organise to run their own, by registering on the website *cleanupaustraliaday.org.au*. Any donations made will contribute to gloves, bags, and information packs sent to groups once they have signed up.



New 10.5 Million

Park Reopens

Approximately 3000 people per week are expected to use the new and improved Gore Hill Park in St Leonards, as part of Willoughby City Council's largest project for 2019. Reopening this March, 10.5 million was invested into redeveloping and designing the park's sports and community facilities. It is set to become the jewel in the crown of the Lower North Shore's sporting community, with a new synthetic oval, walking track and large-scale playground.

"The new offerings ensure more people can use the space more often. The car park, perimeter path, change rooms, community function room, toilets and playground will be accessible for prams and wheelchairs, ensuring easy access," Mayor Giles-Gidney said.

Parents Urged to Preach Road Safety

For many parents, the school run can be a stressful time of the day. But for Hornsby Hospital's Director of Emergency Medicine, Dr Clare Skinner, there has been an increase in road crossing related injuries. Making the necessary changes is

fundamental, with Ms Skinner reminding parents to preach road safety to little ones.

"As a parent, I've seen others do things in school drop off zones that they really shouldn't be doing, like three point turns or using their mobiles. Then I come to work in emergency and see children who have been hit by cars. It's heartbreaking because often it's something as simple as obeying the road rules that will prevent these sorts of accidents."

Safety Improvements

for State's Waterways



Gladys Berejiklian recently announced an extra \$37.6 million in funding for Marine Rescue NSW over the next four years. To the delight of boaters on NSW waterways, this initiative hopes to save lives on the water by delivering new purpose-built rescue vessels, upgraded operational centres and improvements to the marine radio network.

"The NSW Liberals & Nationals government will establish a new rescue unit on Lord Howe Island, as well as new or upgraded bases and boat buildings at Tweed Heads, Ballina, Narooma, Lake Macquarie, Middle Harbour, Newcastle and the Central Coast," commented Minister for Emergency Services Troy Grant.

Killara High School Upgrade

ocal families will benefit from a further \$15 million major upgrade to Killara High School, funded by the NSW Government.

The upgrade will include the delivery of 17 classrooms, new staff areas and new toilet facilities.

Member for Davidson, Jonathan O'Dea, stated he is ecstatic about the changes and the positive difference this investment will create for school students, families and teachers.

"This \$15 million upgrade is great news for local families and educators. It's so important that we have top-quality school facilities for Killara High School students now and into the future," Mr O'Dea said.

Education Minister, Rob Stokes, said this is another initiative the NSW Government is supporting in order to provide school resources and opportunities to make a difference. Part of the NSW Government's record \$6 billion school building program, this plan includes more than 170 new and

upgraded schools, including, upgrades to St Ives North Public School, St Ives High School and the new Lindfield Learning Village, which opened earlier this year.

Previously benefiting from \$7.9 million in NSW Government funding,

in 2014 Killara High School received 22 permanent classrooms, shared learning spaces, a replacement sports court and the removal of 6 demountable classrooms. The current \$15 million upgrades are set to transform the school.

The most liveable region in Australia

The Northern Sydney region is set to become the most liveable region in Australia, with eight proactive councils joining a landmark conference to map a path to success. A first-time occurrence, over 90 councillors, mayors and senior staff heard from experts at the Northern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (NSROC) conference.

On the agenda were discussions of smart planning, creative cultural infrastructure, housing affordability, transport and sustainability. The NSROC conference included non-profits, experts, politicians, shadow ministers and senior government representatives, to ensure a diverse and rich view of what it takes to be the most liveable region of Australia. NSROC President and Willoughby City Council Mayor Gail Giles-Gidney opened the conference.

"With a squeeze on space and conflicting demands, NSROC has been proactive in shaping the region into the most enviable and liveable region in Australia. Affordable housing, open space, sports facilitates and an environment that supports healthy lifestyles all contribute to liveability," Ms Giles-Gidney said.

Speakers included the Department of Planning & Environment, Create NSW, Greater Sydney Commission, National Heart Foundation, Minister Anthony Roberts and the NSW Premier.



"NSROC has been proactive in shaping the region into the most enviable and liveable region in Australia," Ms Giles-Gidney said.

Encouraging Healthy, Active Kids

he hugely popular Active Kids program is set to expand with Gladys Berejiklian announcing that two separate \$100 vouchers will be available for each NSW child. Easing the costs of living, the Premier revealed that more than 1 million vouchers have been issued since launching. The overarching aim of the initiative is to encourage an active lifestyle and participation in sports, given that approximately 28% of Australian children are overweight.

From July this year, families will be able to access two Active Kids vouchers, so that the little ones are financially able to play sport throughout the whole year. Sports registration, membership expenses and fees for physical activities such as swimming, football, netball, dance lessons and cricket have been popular options that parents have used with their vouchers.

"We are doing everything we can through our strong financial management to ease the cost of living burdens on families. Because of the strength of the NSW Budget, we are able to allocate more funding because we want more kids to be happy and healthy," commented Treasurer Dominic Perrottet.



From July this year, families will be able to access two Active Kids vouchers per child.

The two vouchers cannot be combined to pay for a single program costing more than \$100. Instead, the voucher is designed to help pay the cost of two separate terms of sport such as the

summer and winter season of netball. To apply for the Active Kids voucher, parents can register online with Service NSW and find a registered sport or physical activity, club or organisation to use their voucher.





"I started working as a reporter at my local newspaper when I left high school in the UK at 18. I worked my way up through the ranks at various newspapers to editor, then worked at a few magazines before moving to Australia at the age of 26. I was the editor, then publisher, of a business magazine in Sydney for five years. I had already started my blog as a hobby when I was made redundant and I decided, encouraged by many of the entrepreneurs I'd interviewed for the magazine, to try and turn it into a business. Almost seven years and two kids later, it's still going strong!"

Jen showcases her love for design on her blog, The Interiors Addict, a hub for design inspiration that started as a hobby, which is now Jen's full-time job.

"Interiors Addict started as a place just for me, to store all the interior inspiration I saw online and small projects I did in my home. Being a journalist by background, it was second nature for me to approach interior designers and stylists to profile them. Word got around about the site and it snowballed into something much bigger than I ever imagined. I still pinch myself that it's my job!"

The next generation

Headmaster Russell Bailey

In just over twelve months since it was launched, the online game Fortnite, became a cultural sensation with more than 200 million players worldwide. That's eight times the population of Australia. Last June, thousands of fans flocked to the first live stadium tournament in Los Angeles, where players paired up with celebrities to compete for a top prize of \$1M US. Imagine the future impact of this new e-sports culture! What's at stake here? The survival of an onscreen avatar.

Fifty years ago, NASA astronaut Neil Armstrong was the first man to walk on the moon. This was seen live on television around the world thanks, in part, to 'the Dish' radio telescope at Parkes. The astronauts were trained in every detail of their mission – physically, mentally and emotionally. Their habits had to be ready for precision responses to get all the way to the moon and back on a pioneering mission where much was still unknown. What's at stake here? Not only

the pride of the USA but also the lives of the astronauts and their families. Any mistake could end in human tragedy.

So what's at stake when children turn up at school every weekday, 40 weeks each year, for thirteen years of their lives? At the end of thirteen years (or even thirteen weeks), we cannot simply discard the avatar student and start the game over again. What happens at school every day has to count for a lifetime. Cyber experts say that the vocational futures of our children are at least as difficult to predict and prepare for as the Apollo landing on the moon. So, we must make wise choices about curriculum and pedagogy to equip our next generation with content and habits that will prepare them for their uncertain future.

At the 5th International STEM in Education conference in Brisbane last November, Australia's Chief Scientist, Dr Alan Finkel, advocated for a 'content-rich curriculum'

at schools, where students worked towards mastering particular disciplines, especially science and mathematics. It's so important that our students learn to understand what they are reading from different sources, with critical thinking to discern true and important inputs for life decisions.

To make the best use of every day at school, I believe that education should aim to lead our students through rich content and excellent pedagogy towards discovering the truth about our world, human destiny, moral accountability, right living, and their potential. At my school with a Christian worldview in education, this is brought together in the context of an eternal hope grounded in God's unfailing love for all the world revealed in Jesus Christ.

Let's seek to make every day educationally beneficial for all of our children at school throughout this new year!

Barker thrive at BHP Awards

ucy Lake's (2018) Biomimicry inspired carbon fiber racing oar has seen her placed second in the Engineering category of the 2019 BHP Foundation Science and Engineering Awards.

Lucy designed the racing oar to improve rowing efficiency and power. The design aims to reduce drag and enhance performance. "This is the third phase of oar design, following on from timber oars, laminated oars and now introducing biomimicry inspired design," Lucy explained.

She was one of only four students to qualify to attend the International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) Finals to be held in Arizona. Over 1800 high school students from 75 countries, regions and territories are given the opportunity to showcase their independent research.

Fellow Barker student, James Casey-Brown (2018), was placed 3rd in the Engineering category for his minimally obtrusive 'Surf-



Safe' swimming device designed to be activated when a swimmer in the surf is at risk of drowning.

James said he had designed and produced a piece of equipment to prevent drowning in the surf through an inflation device situated around the waist. "The device has been deliberately designed so that users do not feel stigmatised as unable to swim, encouraging them to use the 'surf safe' device," he said.

The BHP Foundation Science and Engineering Awards are a partnership between the BHP Foundation, CSIRO, the Australian Science Teachers Association and each state and territory Science Teachers Association.

Since 1981, the awards have been recognising student excellence.

In 2018 Oliver Nicholls (2017) was awarded 1st place in the Engineering category at the BHP Billiton Foundation Science and Engineering Awards for his autonomous robotic window cleaner, going on to achieve further worldwide recognition at the ISEF with another win in his category.

Mrs Wheen said the classroom facilities also offered many options for students, including a large deck which is covered and can be used by the students for quiet activities or lunch clubs. "It is a school with so much to offer," she said.

The educational sector is ever-changing. It continues to present a variety of 'opportunities' or 'options', which are touted as 'modern' or 'progressive', but is this really true?

Montessori Education has been an established and successful method of education for over 100 years. It is highly regarded because it has always focused on the development of the child, which we now know as 'modern best practices' in education.

As someone who has been involved in education for over 20 years, I have seen a steady movement towards more agreement on the best characteristics of quality education.

It is widely agreed that the more personalised the education method is, the more effective it will be for the learner. This intrinsic motivation is much more valuable to developing lifelong learners than extrinsic motivation. We understand that a community of learners work better than those in competition with each other. Increasingly, creativity and divergent thinking are going to be more useful skills in the future, while a love of learning is highly valuable and should be fostered.

These characteristics might seem obvious, but they are however, not the cornerstone of most educational methods. There is an appetite for change, but not a strong pedagogical basis to implement these changes effectively.



'In-chair whitening' means the whitening process occurs in the dental chair, over a time period ranging from 60 - 90 minutes. A 'take-home procedure' means most of the whitening happens at home. The tray is then filled with a whitening solution and is worn for a period of time, generally a week, either during the day or at night.

In approximately an hour it is possible, in some cases, to brighten teeth by up to eight shades. Either way, this will generally involve having impressions taken, which are then used to make custom fitting bleaching trays. Often following a professional inchair procedure, patients are given a take-home kit to help 'top up' the whitening process.

Both options will whiten teeth however, the inchair whitening technique is more immediate and arguably gives a brighter result.

On March 26th, Australians are urged to end the stigma, spread awareness and "I will be on medication for the rest of 'Go Purple' – the international colour for epilepsy. A common brain disorder that takes the form of recurring seizures, approximately 250,000 Aussies live with the condition, according to the Epilepsy Australia Foundation. Purple Day aims to encourage people to talk about the condition and to remind those who live with seizures, that they are not alone. Sydney resident, David Ross,

knows all too well about the impact epilepsy can have.

"In 2001 I suffered from two brain aneurysms, and luckily after immediate surgery I was fortunate enough to be alive, given the low survival rate. However, due to the event, I had scarring between my brain and skull, which can cause epilepsy. So for the past 18 years I have had approximately 8 - 10 seizures, and the downside of it is that when I have a seizure I lose my license for 3 months."

my life for epilepsy, but in terms of the severity, I have a mild case compared to many other Australians. At the end of the day, I would classify myself as a very lucky person because I'm a healthy 53-year-old who if things had gone differently could be six-feet-under."

By sharing experiences like Mr Ross', we hope that more light is






